Marian R. David is founding director of Sustaining the Soul that Serves, a nonprofit organization which is designed to support those who serve others in finding spiritual practices such as meditation, journaling, and creative expressions to sustain themselves in their work. Marian has developed a cadre of facilitators who have worked with her to conduct spiritual retreats across the country and internationally. Marian spent over six years as director of the Children's Defense Fund's Educational and Youth Development.

She received her bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education from Fayetteville State University and her master's degree from South Carolina State University. She also studied at the University of South Carolina to receive her specialist certification. Marian is a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Community Fellowship Program in the Department of Urban Studies where she combined studying at Harvard Divinity School in the fields of spirituality and leadership development. Marian is currently enrolled in a

spiritual direction program and recently completed a course of study at Claremont School of Theology (2005). Having completed training in the Coaches Training Institute (2004), Marian is a life coach.

Educators can encourage a single student or their class' participation. Every authentic, well-written essay becomes a winner and is recognized as a published work, searchable by the author's name and school. Keynote Speaker: **Barbara Lewis**



Barbara Lewis is a national award-winning author and educator who teaches kids how to think and solve real problems. Her students at Jackson Elementary School in Salt Lake City, Utah, initiated the cleanup of hazardous waste, improved sidewalks, planted thousands of trees, and fought crime. They instigated and pushed through several state laws and an amendment to a national law, garnering 10 national awards, including two President's Environmental Youth Awards, the Arbor Day Award, the Renew America Award, and Pledge and a Promise Environmental Award. They have also been recognized in the Congressional Record three times.

Barbara has been featured in/on many national newspapers, magazines, and news programs, including *Newsweek*, the *Wall Street Journal*, *Family Circle*, *CBS This Morning*, *CBS World News*, and CNN. She has also written many articles and short stories for national magazines. Her books for Free Spirit Publishing—*What Do You Stand For? A Kid's Guide to Building Character*, *The Kid's Guide to Social Action*, *Kids with Courage*, and *The Kid's Guide to Service Projects*—have won Parenting's Reading Magic Award and been named "Best of the Best for Children" by the American Library Association, among other honors.

Barbara has lived in Indiana, New Jersey, Switzerland, Belgium, Utah, and Poland. She and her husband, Larry, currently reside in Park City, Utah. They have four children: Mike, Andrea, Chris, and Sam, five perfect grandchildren, and a forest of shy deer, a bold moose, busy squirrels, and feathered friends.

The need for supported transition services begins well before youth graduate from high school. This presentation will provide valuable information on designing and developing successful transition programs for 16-21 year old adults with mild to moderate disabilities. Each program that will be discussed offers varying degrees of support which can be manipulated in order to reach diverse ability levels found in secondary special education classrooms. 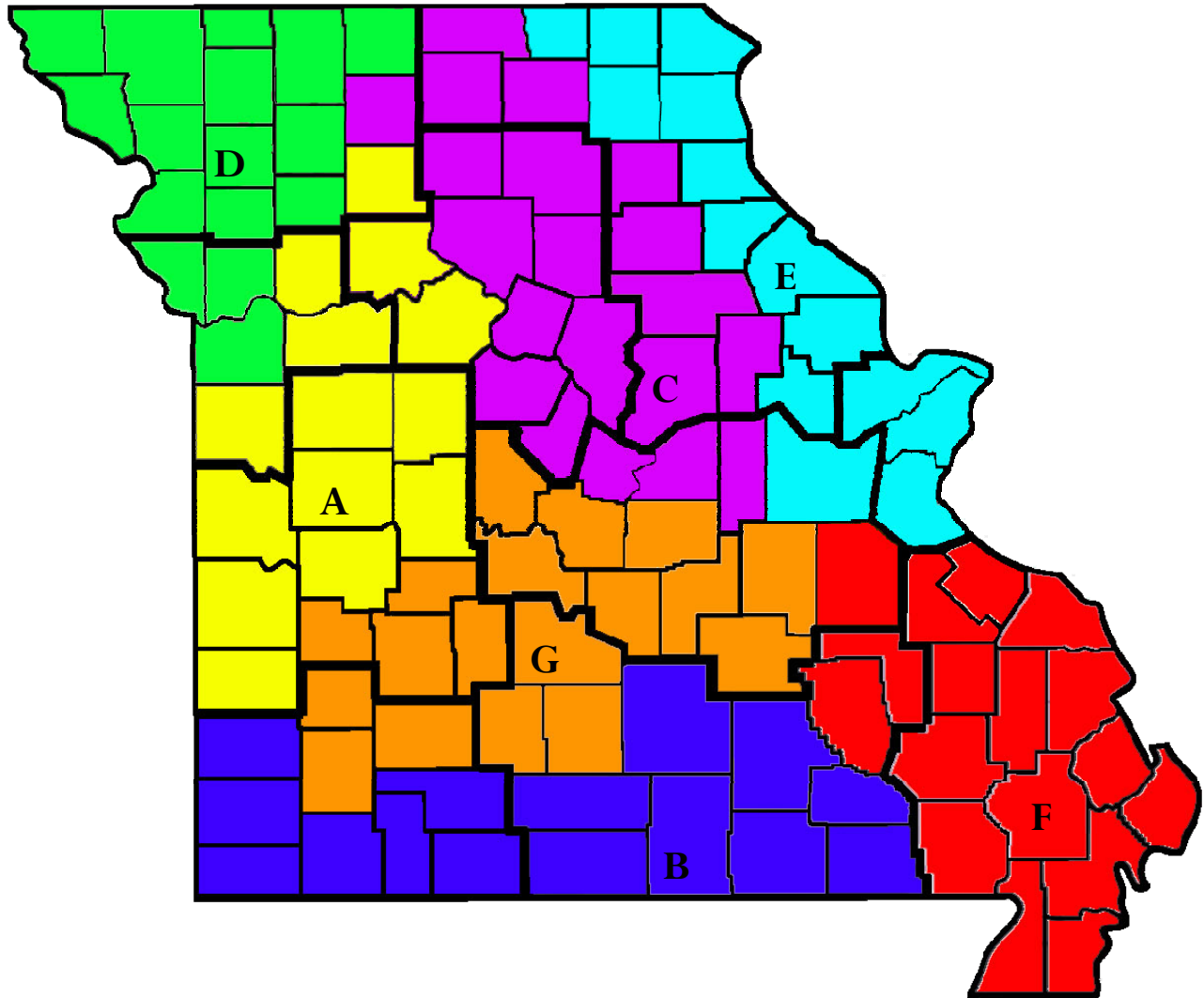
